HARRISSI, or TRUE BERMUDA LILY—Pure white, very fragrant, and a remarkable profusion of bloom, characterize this charming and celebrated Easter Lily. It is a magnificent variety for church decoration at Easter, and tens of thousands are grown for this purpose alone. Our first size bulbs will bear from 8 to 12 flowers, and smaller sizes 4 to 6. **Not hardy in our climate unless very well protected.** Bulbs ready for planting in September.

LONGIFOLIUM—Has long white trumpet-shaped bloom. Excellent for growing in pots, also for bedding out, as it is quite hardy. It needs some protection, however, at the North. Blooms in June. Each, 15c., 2 for 25c., postpaid

DOUBLE TIGER LILY (Tigrinum Flora Plena)—Hardy. Beautiful orange-red flowers, spotted with black. Double and showy. Grows 4 to 6 feet in height, and begin blooming early in August. Each, 15c., postpaid

CANDIDUM—Hardy. This beautiful garden Lily has pure white flowers, with heavy yellow stamens, and exquisitely fragrant. Bears from 5 to 20 blossoms. Must be planted in early autumn to succeed well, as it makes its leaf growth at once after planting, and prepares itself for early flowering. Begins blooming in June. A good potting variety also. TENUIFOLIUM—A very early sort having small scarlet blooms borne on slender stems 18 to 24 inches in height. Very easily grown in pots, and a beauty for cutting. If planted outside it must be well protected. Each, 20c.

Ixias Ready in September

The flowers of the Ixias are produced in spikes, and are of many brilliant and dazzling shades. They are equally good for outside planting or window garden. When grown in pots, use six or eight bulbs to a 5 inch pot, and otherwise treat same as other fall bulbs. Give plenty of water, sunshine and air when about to bloom and you will well be repaid for the small cost of the bulbs.

Jonquils Ready in September

Sometimes Daffodils are called Jonquils, but this is wrong; Jonquils are smaller, very fragrant, and more delicate than most Daffodils.

Single Jonquils—Single deep golden-yellow flowers, powerfully scented. Good for forcing.

Lilies

Harrissi and Candidum are ready in August.

Other varieties not until October and November.

Very rightly named "Queen of Flowers." Of faultless beauty and purity. They grow more popular each season. Many of them being hardy, hence, when once planted, they are good for years with little additional care.

Lilies for Bedding should be ordered as early as possible, to be forwarded immediately on receipt of bulbs. They require little care beyond that of protecting them well in winter by using a liberal supply of coarse manure or leaves; also mulch on the ground about the plant should be used in summer, as the rays of the hot sun may injure them. A well-drained soil suits them best. Manure should not come in contact with the bulb. They should be planted about six inches deep. Our list is made up of varieties which are easily grown.

Pot Culture.—Put them in 5 or 6-inch pots, using a compost of one-half rich loamy soil, one-fourth well-rotted cow manure and one-fourth of clean sharp sand; also some broken pieces of pots and charcoal in the bottom of pot for drainage. Place the bulb in the center of the pot.

AURATUM (Golden-Rayed Lily of Japan)—Hardy. Beyond question the grandest of all the Lily family. Flowers pure white, thickly studded with crimson spots, while through the center of each petal runs a clear golden band. Fully expanded, the flowers are of very large size. They are produced abundantly from July to October, and possess a most delicious fragrance. Blooms about July 15th.

SPECIOSUM RUBRUM (Lancifolium Rubrum)—Hardy. White, heavily spotted with rich crimson spots. The Speciosum and its varieties are magnificent border plants, and are also excellent for pot culture. Height about 3 feet. Blooms about August 15th Each, 15c., 2 for 25c., postpaid
