

## Livingston's Choice Roses

The autumn is a very good time for setting out Roses as they are then dormant, having dropped their leaves, and stand transplanting perfectly. After setting in the ground, which should be spaded deeply, it is a good plan to draw the soil up around the plant, also add some coarse litter, leaves, straw, etc. The branches should be trimmed, using a sharp knife so as to make a smooth cut, quite early in spring before growth begins, as this gives the roots a chance to get started. Our large, field-grown plants, set out in October, will give some fine blooms next season, however, they should not be permitted to bloom too freely the first season.

### Hybrid Tea Roses

This class is made up of varieties obtained by crossing Tea and Hardy Perpetual Roses, retaining the freedom of bloom of the Teas, also some of the hardiness of the latter. Most of them are hardy with protection, and by far the best class for bedding out where moderate Winters prevail. We cannot speak too highly of the roses in this class. They always please.

**American Beauty**—This famous rose has buds large, full, double and exceedingly sweet; color, rich, rosy-crimson; very lasting after cutting. Fine plants, each, 35c.

**Bessie Brown**—A lovely new rose; extra large, full and double, and deliciously perfumed; healthy vigorous grower. Constant, profuse bloomer; color white, delicately shaded with rose.

**Franz Deegen**—New. A very free bloomer, rapid and clean grower, with flowers of a golden-yellow, with deep orange center, on long, straight stems. Buds are long and pointed, of good size. Received gold medal and \$50 prize at Kansas City Flower Show, silver medals and other awards at numerous other exhibitions. 35c.

**Golden Gate**—Creamy white, flushed with pink and salmon. Very robust and a persistent bloomer. A beauty.

**Helen Gould**—One of the finest for general planting. Strong grower, free bloomer; large size, and very hardy. Bloom perfectly double, buds beautiful, long, pointed; color, a warm rosy-crimson. Easy to grow.

**Ivory** (White Golden Gate)—"Ivory" embodies all of the good points of the Golden Gate. Size, freedom of bloom, strong, vigorous, healthy growth, with a pure white color. A rose which must at once meet with popular favor.

**Kaiserin Augusta Victoria**—Elegant large pointed buds and very large, full, double flowers. Color, delicate dreamy-white, deliciously fragrant; strong stems; rich glossy foliage.

**Lady Battersea**—Long, pointed buds of the largest size; color, bright cherry-crimson; stems stiff and long; strong grower and free in bloom; a promising bedder.

**Mad. Caroline Testout**—Petals large and of elegant form; exquisitely edged and bordered with clear silvery rose; flowers and buds extra large; color, brilliant satiny-rose, center clear red.

**Mad. Jules Grolez**—Very free blooming variety; large, full, finely formed flowers; color, charming shade of satiny-pink.

**Meteor**—Of the deepest glowing crimson; flowers of medium size, very double, and petals slightly recurving; a beautiful open rose; a free bloomer. Good potting, cutting or bedding sort.

**Mrs. Mawley**—Color, bright pink. A magnificent garden rose.

**Sombreuil**—Large, beautiful, white, tinged with delicate rose; a strong grower.

**Souv. Pres. Carnot**—Large, full, double, exquisitely shaped flowers, with heavy, thick, shell-like petals; buds long and pointed—perfect; color, delicate rosy-blush, shaded deeper at center; fragrance delicious. Strong grower and free bloomer.

### Climbing Tea Roses

These are exceptionally fine climbers for the Southern States and nothing could be more choice to cover a porch or trellis.

**Climbing Meteor**—Perpetual blooming. Color, rich velvety-crimson. A very vigorous grower and profuse bloomer.

**Marechal Niel**—Its magnificent golden-yellow buds are worn the world over.

**President Cleveland**—Flowers magnificent, extra large, deep and double; buds are beautiful; fragrance delightful; color, pure snow white, sometimes faintly tinged with pale yellow. Identical with Marie Guillott except that this variety is a rapid climber—ten to fifteen feet high. Blooms all season.

**Reine Marie Henrietta**—Crimson flowered; ever blooming; flowers exquisitely formed, very full and double; fragrant; free flowering.

**Mary Washington** (Noisette)—Bears large, double, fragrant white flowers in large clusters, in great abundance. Vigorous, rapid grower.

### Hardy June Rose

**Mad. Plantier**—Literally covered in the spring with pure white, perfectly double, fragrant flowers, which hang on for a long time. Make large dense bushes. A beautiful cemetery rose. Hardy as an oak, without protection.

### The La France Set

A choice group of Hybrid Teas, widely known and celebrated everywhere for hardiness, constant bloom, beautiful color and fragrance.

**Pink La France**—Silvery pink; very popular.

**Red La France (Duchess of Albany)**—Deep rich rose pink flowers.

**White La France**—Large, elegant, pearl-white flowers flushed with rose.

**Striped La France**—Shows clear stripes of both lovely pink and white tints.

### Hardy Perpetual Garden Roses

The following selection of Hybrid Roses can be highly recommended for outdoor planting, perfectly hardy, but are benefited by slight protection of leaves or coarse litter during the winter; also a little straw tied loosely about the tops.

**Alfred Colomb**—Extra large round flowers, very double and full; color, rich cherry-red, passing to bright, rich crimson; very fragrant.

**Anna de Diesbach**—Brilliant rose-color, with long pointed buds, large perfectly formed blossoms; fragrant; vigorous; persistent bloomer.

**Baron Bonstetten**—Extra large flowers, very firm, almost round and full; rich dark crimson; very fragrant; abundant bloomer.

**Captain Christy**—Delicate fresh color; blooms almost throughout the season; vigorous grower; grand foliage.

**Coquette des Alps**—Large full finely formed flowers; color, pure white, faintly tinged with pale blush; beautiful; profuse bloomer; hardy.

**General Jacqueminot**—Bright crimson scarlet; exceedingly rich and velvety; strong healthy grower and free bloomer; very hardy.

**Jubilee**—Large flowers, 5 to 6 inches across; very full and double; buds long and graceful; color, glowing velvety crimson; fragrance delicious.

**Mad. Chas. Wood**—Flowers extra large, double, full and quite fragrant, color, bright fiery scarlet, passing to fine rosy-crimson, shaded with maroon; showy; handsome, blooms early and late.

**Magna Charta**—Extra large, full flowers; very double; of fine form and sweet; color, clear rosy red, beautifully blushed with violet crimson; a sure and profuse bloomer; one of the hardiest.

**Marchioness of Lorne**—Brilliant rose, shaded vivid crimson; full cup-shaped bloom, very fragrant. Almost the only hardy, red rose which blooms all season.

**Marshall P. Wilder**—Extra large bloom, full and very handsome; dark red; a free bloomer; long stems.

**Mrs. John Laing**—Constant bloomer; hardy, immense flowers, full and double, borne in great profusion on long, stiff stems, and exceedingly sweet; color, clear, bright, shining pink, buds long and pointed.

**Paul Neyron**—Deep shining pink; extra large; of fine form.

**Prince Camille de Rohan**—Deep velvety crimson, almost black; large and fine.

**Ulrich Brunner**—Extra large, bold flowers, full and globular; color, rich glowing crimson.
